MALAYSIA-INDONESIA TIES

A NEW ERA FOR DEFENCE DIPLOMACY

AST week, I had the op-portunity to pay a return visit to my counterpart, Prabowo Subianto, De-fence Minister of the Republic of Indonesia. Prabowo had paid a courtesy call on me the previous year; his first international visit immedi-ately after his appointment by

first international visit immedi-ately after his appointment by President Joko Widodo in Octo-ber last year. In the spirit of continued friendship, I led the delegation from the Defence Ministry to meet him and discuss several is-sues that are of interest to both countries. As a gesture to illustrate the

countries. As a gesture to illustrate the deep defence ties between our countries, I flew to Jakarta on an Indonesian-built Royal Malayslan Air Force (RMAF) CN-233. Several matters were discussed between the Malayslan and Indonesian delegations in the spirit of cordiality, mutual re-

spect and understanding. Among the issues raised were measures to improve the security at the sulu and sulawesi Seas, including the east coast of Cabab

including the east coast of Sabah. Both sides expressed their con-fidence in the effective imple-mentation of the Trilateral Co-operative Arrangement (TCA) be-tween Indonesia, Malaysia and the Philippines in addressing the common maritime security threats in waters bordering the littorial states. littoral states.

Interast in waters bordering the littoral states. I emphasised on the Malaysian Armed Forces' (MAF) commit-ment in securing the area. Prabowo and I agreed to meet with Delifn Lorenzana, the Sec-retary of National Defence of the Philippines in February to fur-ther discuss efforts on strength-ening the TCA. The meeting discussed how Malaysia and Indonesia can work more closely to develop defence

industry cooperation. As it stands, there are estab-lished collaborations between Malaysia and Indonesia in the de-fence industry. However, I be-lieve we can further consolidate these efforts for our mutual ben-efft.

strengthen cooperation between both countries' defence industry. We also touched on matters pertaining to the 42nd Malaysia-indonesia General Border Com-mittee (GBC) scheduled around september or October in Marysia. The GBC meeting is an annual consultation between the de-gradient of both countries and it was previously held in Bali. Unconesia. Before the meeting concluded, extended an invitation to prabowo and the Indonesian De-

fence Ministry to participate in the upcoming Defence Services Asia Exhibition and Conference (DSA 2020) and the National Se-curpty Asia 2020 (NATSEC 2020) which will be held in Kuala Lumpur from April 20 to 23. T is hoped that the defence fiplomacy between Malaysia and monesia will be enhanced to a greater level in the future, all at once benefiting both Southeast Asian countries.
